Galapagos Penguin	<i>Spheniscus mendiculus</i>	A few around Floreana, Rabida, Bartolome & Santi.
Waved Albatross	<i>Phoebastria irrorata</i>	40+ on Espanola
Galapagos Petrel	<i>Pterodroma phaeopygia</i>	18 off of San Cristobel; 4 of Espanola & Isabella
Galapagos Shearwater	<i>Puffinus iherminieri subalaris</i>	Recently split from Audubon's. Very common
White-vented Storm-Petrel	<i>Oceanites gracilis</i>	Used to be known as Elliot's. Common
Galapagos Storm-Petrel	<i>Oceanodroma tethys</i>	Used to be known as Wedged-rumped. Widespread
Band-rumped Storm-Petrel	<i>Oceanodroma castro</i>	A few very widely scattered.
Red-billed Tropicbird	<i>Phaethon aethereus</i>	Common off Espanola and Floreana
Brown Pelican	<i>Pelecanus occidentalis</i>	Widespread in small numbers
Blue-footed Booby	<i>Sula nebouxii</i>	Common and widespread
Nazca Booby	<i>Sula granti</i>	Common on Espanola and Floreana
Magnificent Frigatebird	<i>Fregata magnificens</i>	Common and widespread. Some still breeding.
Great Frigatebird	<i>Fregata minor</i>	Some still breeding though not as common as MF
Great Blue Heron	<i>Ardea herodias</i>	Scattered in small numbers
Great Egret	<i>Ardea alba</i>	Singles at Puerto Ayora harbor & Black Turtle Cove
Cattle Egret	<i>Bubulcus ibis</i>	2 of Floreana; common on Santa Cruz
Lava Heron	<i>Butorides striata sundivalli</i>	Scattered in small numbers on rocky shorelines
Yellow-crowned Night-Heron	<i>Nyctanassa violacea</i>	Individuals on Espanola, Santa Cruz, Santiago
Greater Flamingo	<i>Phoenicopterus ruber</i>	25 on Floreana. 2 on Rabida. A subspecies?
White-cheeked Pintail	<i>Anas bahamensis</i>	20 on Floreana. 2 on Rabida. A subspecies?
Galapagos Hawk	<i>Buteo galapagoensis</i>	5 on Espanola. 1 on Rabida. 3 on Santiago
Common Moorhen	<i>Gallinula chloropus</i>	1 on Santa Cruz
American Oystercatcher	<i>Haematopus palliatus</i>	A few widely scattered. Subspecies?
Black-necked Stilt	<i>Himantopus mexicanus</i>	7 on Floreana
Black-bellied Plover	<i>Pluvias squatarola</i>	1 on Santiago
Semipalmated Plover	<i>Charadrius semipalmatus</i>	2 on Floreana, Santa Cruz & Rabida. 3 on Santiago
Whimbrel	<i>Numenius phaeopus</i>	A few widely scattered.
Spotted Sandpiper	<i>Actitis macularia</i>	1 on Floreana
Wandering Tattler	<i>Heterosceles incanus</i>	Widespread in small numbers along the coastlines
Ruddy Turnstone	<i>Arenaria interpres</i>	Very common along coastlines
Sanderling	<i>Calidris alba</i>	1 on San Cristobel and 2 on Floreana
Least Sandpiper	<i>Calidris minutilla</i>	3 on Floreana
Wilson's Phalarope	<i>Phalaropus tricolor</i>	4 of the Floreana lagoon
Red-necked Phalarope	<i>Phalaropus lobatus</i>	A raft of 50 off on Espanola; common off Isabella

South Polar Skua	<i>Stercorarius maccormicki</i>	1 seen off Isabella likely to be this species
Lava Gull	<i>Larus fuliginosus</i>	8 on San Cristobal and 5 on Santa Cruz
Swallow-tailed Gull	<i>Creagrus furcatus</i>	Common on Espanola and Floreana
Royal Tern	<i>Sterna maxima</i>	1 off on Espanola
Common Tern	<i>Sterna hirundo</i>	1 off Fernandina
Brown Noddy	<i>Anous stolidus</i>	Common
Galapagos Dove	<i>Zenaida galapagoensis</i>	4 on Espanola; 3 on Santa Cruz; 1 on Baltra
Dark-billed Cuckoo	<i>Coccyzus melacoryphus</i>	3 on Santa Cruz
Smooth-billed Ani	<i>Crotophaga ani</i>	3 on San Cristobal and common on Santa Cruz
Vermillion Flycatcher	<i>Pyrocephalus rubinus</i>	2 on Santa Cruz
Galapagos Flycatcher	<i>Myiarchus magnirostris</i>	Widespread in small numbers
Galapagos Mockingbird	<i>Nesomimus parvulus</i>	10+ on Santa Cruz, 5 on Rabida, 6 on Santiago
Charles Mockingbird	<i>Nesomimus trifasciatus</i>	2 on Champion off of Floreana
Hood Mockingbird	<i>Nesomimus macdonaldi</i>	25 on Espanola
Chatham Mockingbird	<i>Nesomimus melanotis</i>	2 on San Cristobal
Yellow Warbler	<i>Dendroica petechia</i>	Common and widespread <i>D. p. aureola</i>
Large Ground-Finch	<i>Geospiza magnirostris</i>	10 on Santa Cruz; 2 on Santiago; 1 on Isabella
Medium Ground-Finch	<i>Geospiza fortis</i>	The second most common finch
Small Ground-Finch	<i>Geospiza fuliginosa</i>	The most common of the finches
Common Cactus-Finch	<i>Geospiza scandens</i>	2 on Santa Cruz
Large Cactus-Finch	<i>Geospiza conirostris</i>	4 on Espanola, this being the nominate race
Vegetarian Finch	<i>Camarhynchus crassirostris</i>	2 on Santa Cruz
Large Tree-Finch	<i>Camarhynchus psittacula</i>	4 on Santa Cruz
Small Tree-Finch	<i>Camarhynchus parvulus</i>	8+ on Santa Cruz; 4 on San Cristobal
Woodpecker Finch	<i>Camarhynchus pallidus</i>	2 in flight on Snata Cruz; 1 on Isabella
Warbler Finch	<i>Certhidea olivacea</i>	1 on San Cristobal <i>C.o.lutea</i> ; 6 on Espanola <i>C.o. cinerascens</i> ; 2 on Santa Cruz <i>C.o. olivacea</i>

Galapagos Fur Seal	<i>Arctocephalus galapagoensis</i>	5 on Santiago

Rice Rat sp	<i>Nesoryzomys sp</i>	1 dead on Fernandina, either Fernandina or Darwin's

Santa Cruz Giant Tortoise	<i>Geochelone elephant. porteri</i>	A least a dozen on Santa Cruz
Galapagos Green Turtle	<i>Chelonia mydas agassisi</i>	Widespread in small numbers
Marine Iguana	<i>Amblyrhynchus cristatus</i>	6 on Floreana, common on Rabida; 6 on Fernandina
Fernandina Marine Iguana	<i>A. c. cristatus</i>	Common on Fernandina
Isabela Marine Iguana	<i>A. c. albamarlensis</i>	O few seen on Isabella
San Cristobal Marine Iguana	<i>A. c. mertensi</i>	Common on San Cristobal
Santiago Marine Iguana	<i>A. c. mertensi</i>	Same speacies as above. Common on Santiago
Espanola Marine Iguana	<i>A.c. venustissimus</i>	Abundant on Espanola
Lava Lizard	<i>Microlophus albamarlensis</i>	3 on Rabida, 5 on Santiago; 2 on Isabella
San Cristobal Lava Lizard	<i>Microlophus bivittatus</i>	5 on San Cristobal
Floreana Lava Lizard	<i>Microlophus grayi</i>	2 on Floreana
